

SUMMER RESEARCH PROGRAMS



	<p>The Summer Academic Enrichment Program (SAEP) is an intensive, five-week on-campus residential program. It is designed to enhance the academic experience of first generation university students. There is no out of pocket expense to participants for this program. All costs are covered by financial aid program and funding. The goals of SAEP are to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Provide an orientation to graduate education *Prepare participants for working with historically underserved and underrepresented communities *Offer participants with challenging academic courses 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Be a first generation university student b) Be a major within the school of social sciences (students in the school of social ecology may be considered) c) Must have completed lower division writing and preferably, though not required, one year of statistics or calculus prior to the program 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> *SAEP is designed to be challenging. The Summer Undergraduate Mentorship Program (SUMP) of the Hispanic Center of Excellence at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine is a six-week program that offers students from underrepresented groups in medicine and/or economically disadvantages background a unique opportunity to become exposed to the realities and options within the medical profession through “shadowing” experience with a physician. In addition to shadowing, the program offers a broad and comprehensive curriculum that includes medical lectures, hands-on workshops and a research project.

- a) Must have completed at least their freshman year with at least one year in science by June 2017.
- b) Have a GPA of 3.0 or higher
- c) Students must be U.S Citizens, permanent residents or individuals granted Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA).

*SUMP requires a full-time commitment Monday-Friday over six summer weeks. Students will be expected to attend fourteen hours of lecture per week and spend at least six hours per week with their assigned mentor.

*Program participants will be awarded a stipend at the end of the program.

The deadline for the Summer Undergraduate Mentorship Program is on early April of every academic year.

Each summer, there are 80-100 positions available for talented undergraduate students mentored by awarded faculty. The University of Wisconsin-Madison, Psychology Research Experience Program (PREP) provides intensive mentoring and experience in scientific research and professional development to undergraduates from historically underrepresented populations—who have expressed and demonstrated an interest in a career in scientific psychology. As a whole, PREP features a balance of mentored development and networking opportunities.

PREP is a NSF-funded program whose purpose is to increase opportunities for individuals from groups that have traditionally been underrepresented in academic psychology. Thus, the program only considers applications from individuals who meet one of the following eligibility criteria:

- *Be a U.S citizen or legal permanent resident
- *Belong to a racial/ethnic minority group
- *Be part of a low-income household
- *Be the first in their family to attend college

For applicants who meet the eligibility criteria, the following factors are taken into consideration in evaluating applications:

- *University grade point average of 3.0/4.0
- *A strong interest in a career in psychology research. (Note that PREP is not intended for students interested in a career in an applied profession, such as clinical practice, counseling or school psychology, forensic psychology, etc.)

The deadline to apply to the Psychology Research Experience Program (PREP) is on early February of every academic year.
